Department of Health Advance Care Planning Policy for Adults- Public Consultation

The Department of Health (DoH) has launched a public consultation on the draft Advance Care Planning Policy for Adults (18 and over) for Northern Ireland. The consultation will run from 17th December 2021 until Friday 11th March 2022.

A key aim of the Advance Care Planning policy will be to promote clear and consistent messages and practice for all those providing care, support and treatment. It also aims to increase public awareness and understanding of what Advanced Care Planning is, encouraging adults at any stage of life to consider and plan ahead for their future.

The DoH wants Advanced Care Planning conversations to become normalised. All adults have regular opportunities to express their wishes, feelings, beliefs and values in relation to Advance Care Planning and that these are reflected in the care, support or treatment they receive.

Good Recruitment for Older Workers (GROW)

The Centre for Ageing Better have identified that 36% of 50 to 70 year olds feel at a disadvantage when it comes to applying for jobs due to their age. For many older applicants they feel they are being excluded from the job market due to inadequate processes, agebias and lack of engagement from potential employers.

In light of this research, the Centre for Ageing Better has commissioned three projects to tackle inequalities in the workforce: the current and future recruitment landscape for older workers, older workers' own experience of recruitment and an experiment to explore what impact the choice of language used in recruitment materials have on older workers.
